

Nationally important protected landscape – designation through 1949 Act


Main purpose: 'to conserve and enhance natural beauty'


'Natural beauty '– landscape features; geology; wildlife but also rich history of human settlement and land use 'Living landscapes' – a blend of the rich natural and cultural heritage



Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000

- Duty on local authorities to jointly prepare a statutory Management Plan
- Relevant authorities to 'have regard' to main purpose of conserving and enhancing natural beauty

- 89% of AONB agricultural land
- 855 holdings
- 37% holdings are less than 5 ha
- 52% of area is cropped
- Only 34% is grazing land (63% in SW)
- 88,000 sheep
- 66,000 pigs
- 50,000 cattle

- Outward looking economy
- 55% work in market towns
- Only 5-10% work within rural heartland
- Concentration in administration work
- Issues of infrastructure transport, training, broadband
